



State Court Docket Watch: Barnett v. Jones Justice Mitchell explained that the search for the original public meaning of a constitutional provision is not "an attempt to discover and give effect to the intent of the drafters," but "the objective meaning of the text itself because that is the law that was adopted by the public." "[O]riginal public meaning," he wrote, "is 'simply shorthand for the meaning the people understood a provision to have at the time they enacted it."
